





**EA Participant** 

Early Achievers is our state's effort to build a higher quality licensed child care system. Child care centers and licensed family homes receive support from CCAC staff to understand and achieve high quality standards. Our consultants go on-site to provide advice and model best practice. A primary focus this year was outreach and marketing. As of June 30, 2016, our efforts resulted in a 48% participation rate for our region. Our dedicated consultants support providers in their journey towards improving environments, interactions and practices. We are very proud of our provider success in rating at quality levels. Independent evaluators rated 94% of our providers at a quality rating of Level 3 or higher, the highest in the state! Child care centers and homes Early Achievers' participation and ratings are listed on the Department of Early Learning website, giving parents information on the quality of settings as they are seeking child care arrangements.



#### Family, Friends & Neighbors

- 4 Kaleidoscope Play & Learn groups, serving 92 families, occurred in Olympia, Port Angeles, and Yelm.
- Participants reported improved interactions with their children while building positive connections to other adults and community resources.
- One-time events connected families to CCAC/CCAWA information including choosing quality child care, call line, and community parent education events.



Raising A Reader bags, filled with books, were carried home by 1,241 children participating at 42 sites in Grays Harbor, Mason, and Thurston counties. Our evaluations demonstrate that children asked their parents to read to them more frequently and parents responded by increasing how often and how long they spent reading with their children. Parents engaged in more dialogue with their children, increasing language development that directly relates to preparing children for learning to read and kindergarten success.

### **Child Care Aware Professional Development Academy**



- 90 classes were offered, and attended by 1,262 providers who gained new knowledge and skills through 253.5 hours of training.
- 27 infant toddler rooms received on-site consultation and financial support.
- 93 providers attended the Carousel Conference in Aberdeen, receiving 6 hours of training each.

#### **Safe Kids Thurston County**

More than 5,000 families were provided with safety information and supplies. Here are a few examples:


- 414 car seat inspections, with 35 car seats distributed.
- 315 bike helmets distributed.
- 1000 home and infant safety supplies (choke testers, safe sleeping sacks, etc., distributed.
- Numerous life jackets loaned via 13 loaner cabinets at community parks and lakes.
- Hundreds of children participated in International Walk To School Day to promote Youth Pedestrian Safety.

#### Margie's Crisis Nursery

Children ages 3 months to 6 years were nurtured in safe, healthy child care environments while their parents received respite and referrals to resolve their current crisis. 134 homeless children received free child care while their parents worked to find housing and jobs.
